BUDGET HEARING	E - Ron Rowley	Adopted: August 18, 2009 AGENDA ITEM BUDGET HEARING Mrs. Kiesler called the Budget Hearing to order, and asked for public comment. Dr. Mills highlighted several key-points, regarding the preparation, planning, and development of the proposed 2009-2010 budget. Those points included: The timeline was tightened this year due to legislative delay; The complexity of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act "Stimulus Funds" for the distribution of Title and Special Education funds necessitated additional time and planning. The funding is much appreciated; however, the rules and regulations of the program present administrative challenges. Increases to the budget include additions for: employee health insurance premiums, student transportation, higher education increments for teachers, the Western Colorado Community College contract, two additional student contact days, expansion of extended learning, curriculum, maintenance, the implementation of the new math program, funding for school resource officers, and expansion of the Dual Immersion Academy to include 7" grade. Continued funding will include: work on academic interventions, textbook adoption, and leasing of mobile computer labs. Current salary schedules will be maintained with no increase. The required reserves have been maintained. Planned expenditures have been reduced by 2.3 million. The budget results in .85 cents of very dollar spent for instruction. Dr. Mills extended his appreciation to the Executive Team, the Cabinet, the E & E Budget Committee, and the employee associations for their input and focus on student learning. Dr. Mills commented on the positive step of the State Legislature to establish an Interim Committee on School Finance. He acknowledged that with Amendment 23, Referendum C, and the "Stimulus Funding" ending within the next two years, budget challenges will continue. Mrs. Rice indicated she is impressed with the diversity of individuals giving input through the District's website, the District Accountability Committee,	ACTION Convened: 6:00 pm

	 H. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT H-1. Instructional Update: Mr. Steve Schultz and Ms. Judy Thornburg Mr. Schultz updated the Board on upcoming plans for the New Teacher Orientation and the New Administrator Orientation; the focus is to assist staff in understanding the district's instructional direction. As an additional information item, Mr. Schultz announced that Mrs. Cathie Gonzales is working with the new math curriculum; multiple trainings will be ongoing this summer to maximize staff learning for the fall. Ms. Judy Thornburg came forward to provide information, regarding a requirement which necessitates the Board President's signature on the applications for the American Recovery and Reinvested Act "Stimulus Funds" and the regular Special Education funding. Ms. Thornburg explained the complexities involved with the application processes, and stated District 51 is the largest district in the State to meet all the special education indicators. She provided an overview of how the "Stimulus Funds" would be utilized, which included: investment in sound equipment and equipment for teachers, materials to help teachers with the new math program and continuums, student programs, support for families and students, and staff development. The Board thanked Ms. Thornburg for her work in this area. Mr. Tim Leon, the District Safety Officer, came forward to give a short historical presentation on the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program in District 51. The information covered a period of time, starting in 1975 with a grant to where we are today. 30 officers have been in the program, with 10 officers working at the present time. Over the years many programs were introduced at the schools; those programs included: drug awareness, Stranger Danger, Cops for Kids, Partners, Youth Who Care, Sober Grad, DARE, and others. After the Columbine incident, programs became more security driven.

This report reflects a decrease of 12 students, compared to 95 expulsions at the same time last year. Dr. Mills is pleased to see the number of student expulsions at the lowest it has been in the last six years, and attributes the low number to a combination of efforts in the schools; the Positive Behavior Support Program, Progress Monitors, and relationships with the School Resource Officers. Board members discussed the new legislation recently passed to give latitude to administrators when students bring facsimile weapons to school, and the report categories of Willfully Disobedient and Detrimental Behavior, where no students and low numbers were recorded.



Board of Education of Mesa County Valley School District 51 shall perform in accordance with all laws pertaining to public schools as specified by the United States federal government and the Colorado state government. The assistance of legal representatives and authorities may be used by members of the Board or their designee as deemed necessary and/or advisable by a majority of the Board.

All meetings of a quorum of three or more members of the Board at which any public business may be discussed or any formal action taken shall be open to the public at all times except for periods in which the Board is in executive session, but any person who disturbs good order may be required to leave.

A recording shall be made of regular and special meetings as required by law and at a minimum shall be an audio recording. Recordings shall be maintained for 90 days.

All meetings of the Board of Education shall be held in Room A of the Basil T. Knight Staff Development Center, 2523 Patterson Road, Grand Junction, Colorado, at 6:00 pm, unless otherwise publicly announced.

1. Regular Meetings

- a. Work sessions for discussion of educational and business issues shall be held on the first Tuesday of each month. Business items may be added to the agenda when necessary.
- b. Business meetings shall be held on the third Tuesday of each month. Adjournment will be no later than 9:30 p.m.

2. Special Meetings

Special meetings may be called by the president at any time, and shall be called by him/her upon the written request of a majority of the members.

The secretary of the Board shall cause written notice of any special meeting to be mailed or delivered to each member of the Board stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting. If the notice is to be delivered, it shall be in the hands of the member no later than 24 hours prior to the hour set for the meeting. If it is to be mailed, it shall be mailed no later than 72 hours prior to the hour set for the meeting.

Any member may waive notice of the time, place and purpose of a special meeting before, during or after such meeting, and attendance thereat shall be deemed to be a waiver.

No business other than stated in the notice of the meeting shall be transacted unless all members are present and consent to consider and transact other business.

The Board shall adopt an agenda setting forth the business and the order of business to be transacted, discussed or considered at each regular meeting of the Board.

At all regular and special meetings of the Board of Education, no new item shall be considered past the hour of 11 p.m. In the event the agenda has not been completed, the remaining agenda items will be considered at a special meeting set by the Board or be included on the agenda for the next regular meeting.

Except as otherwise specified by state law or Board policies pertaining to its own operating procedures, the Board generally shall operate by the rules prescribed in *Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised*.

Voting

All voting shall be by roll call with each member present voting "Aye" or "No" alphabetically. However, election of the president and vice president may be by secret ballot.

A member may abstain from voting only if excused by the Board for good cause.

A Board member who has a personal or private interest in any proposed or pending matter which presents a conflict of interest in accordance with Board policy shall disclose such interest and shall not vote unless his participation is necessary to obtain a quorum or otherwise enable the Board to act. Under such circumstances, the member shall comply with the voluntary disclosure requirements set out in state law.

To pass, any motion must be approved by a majority of the members present except as state law or policies of this Board may require a majority of full membership.



Nutritious Food Choices

At every possible eating occasion, students will have opportunities to practice what they are taught in nutrition education and choose nutritious snacks that are low in fat, sodium and added sugars.

Schools are encouraged to take steps to ensure:

- nutritious foods are always available as an affordable option whenever food is served or sold;
- students have limited opportunities to eat snacks high in fat, sodium or added sugars; and
- competition with nutritious meals served by the school food service program is minimized.

The emphasis on healthy choices applies to:

- a la carte items (separate food choices) offered by the food service program;
- "competitive foods" which are snacks and beverages sold from vending machines, school stores and fund-raising activities that compete with the food service program; and
- refreshments that are available at school parties, celebrations and meetings.

Each beverage offered for sale to students from any source, including the school cafeteria, vending machines, school stores and fund-raising activities conducted on school grounds, shall satisfy the minimum nutritional standards for beverages adopted by the State Board of Education. This applies to beverages sold on campus during the regular school day and extended school day, including but not limited to before and after school activities such as clubs, year book, band, student government, drama and childcare/latchkey programs.

The foregoing requirement shall not apply to the sale of beverages at school-related events where parents and other adults are a significant part of the audience. Such activities include but are not limited to interscholastic sporting events, school plays and band concerts.

NOTE 1: All schools participating in the School Breakfast and/or National School Lunch program(s) must also comply with any federal rules or regulations regarding competitive food service or the service of Foods of Minimal Nutritional Value, as defined by USDA. Schools that participate in these federal programs must prohibit the sale of foods in the categories of minimal nutritional value in food service areas during designated meal periods.

NOTE 2: The requirement for healthy beverages applies to contracts with vendors entered into or renewed by the school district on or after July 1, 2009.

NOTE 3: The State Board of Education's healthy beverages rules provide, "To the greatest extent possible beverage products should be Colorado produced products." 1 CCR <u>301-79</u>, Rule 3.05.

- Additional salary contingent on an increase in student enrollment. The count is based on
 October's FTE compared to last October. One of the four options will be applied as appropriate:
 - If between 50 124 new students, employees will receive a onetime payment in December 2009. Full-time employees will receive a \$220 one time payment. Part-time employees working 29 hours a week or less will receive a \$110 one time payment.
 - If 125-249 new students, a .5% will be added to the salary schedule retroactive to August 1, 2009.
 - If 250-374 new students, 1% will be added to the salary schedule retroactive August 1, 2009.
 - If 375 or more new students, 1% will be added to the salary schedule retroactive August 1, 2009 plus an additional one time payment to all employees paid in December 2009, for every 125 new students over 250.
